Women's Studies at University of Michigan Ann Arbor. Urmitapa is committed to feminist decolonial praxis and seeks to (co)create communities of resistance and healing across the spaces she occupies and transgresses. A scholar activist, and working in solidarity with communities/groups in the U.S. and India, her program of research focuses on everyday violence, seeks to denaturalize oppressive conditions and to articulate experiences that are silenced by officially sanctioned narratives.



CHRISTOPHER SONN is an Associate Professor in Community Psychology at Victoria University, Melbourne, Australia on the land of the Wurundjeri of the Kulin nation. His research examines histories of colonialism

and oppression and its continuities in various forms of structural violence, and its effects on social identities, intergroup relations and belonging. He holds a Visiting Professorship at the University of the Witwatersrand, South Africa. He is co-editor of Creating Inclusive Knowledges, co-author of Social Psychology and Everyday Life, and Associate Editor of the American Journal of Community Psychology and Community Psychology in Global Perspective.
